But what you have come to is Mount Zion and the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem where the millions of angels have gathered for the festival, with the whole Church in which everyone is a 'firstborn son' and a citizen of heaven. You have come to God himself, the supreme Judge, and been placed with spirits of the saints who have been made perfect; and to Jesus, the mediator who brings a new covenant.

GOSPEL Luke 14:1.7-14.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke.

On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say. "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No: when you are a guest make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.' Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.

The love of the gospel is for everyone; Christ's call is that his followers be open hearted to as many as possible, especially the poor.





Jesus would have been amused at the story of the man who was awarded a gold medal for his humility. Unhappily it had to be taken away from him, for he had taken to wearing it proudly. Humility is being

honest with ourselves; the humble person is grounded in what's real and lasting, not in things that pass quickly. Humble people are not unduly upset when their plans fall apart or if they are ignored and overlooked. Humility has the smell of the earth, of authenticity, and carries an attractive whiff.

The gospels were written to help us on the journey to the kingdom of God - to help us be transformed into the image and likeness of the humble Christ. The humble person looks not to always do the menial task or to be a door-mat, but to have the mind of Christ. The culture tells us that life is about ME. Jesus tells us that our lives are not meant to be self-indulgent but lived in the awareness of being loved by God, and helping others experience God's love.

Jesus was at a meal and noted how some guests sought places of honour. "Are there places reserved for the poor and crippled?" he must have wondered. When we read about the top million richest people, do we ask ourselves "Why are there so many living below the poverty line?" That's the Christ-like question, the honest question, the subversive question, the one Pope Francis might ask. The humble person is aware of the bigger picture, and may not like it.
